The curriculum encourages the evaluation of intersections between gender and religion, highlighting their impact in the Indian context. Participants will also develop their capacity to formulate evidence-based arguments addressing issues arising from gender, sexual, and cultural differences. By the end of the course, students will possess critical analytical tools to interpret, assess, and propose solutions to key social challenges in contemporary India.</p>
