<p>5. Evaluate: Critically assess the role and spectrum of the screenwriter in modern audio visual production, drawing on relevant technical and aesthetic dimensions.</p>	
<p>6. Create: Developing plot outlines, creating unique and interesting characters, developing screenplays for short films, advertisements and music videos.</p>
