COURSE DESCRIPTION/ OBJECTIVES	Module 1 - The course on Literary Criticism 1 aims to offer exposure to the principles that may be predominantly guiding and governing literary works, from ancient to contemporary. It attempts to trace continuity with respect to theories across ages. Module 2 - The course on Research Methodology aims to introduce students to the concept of research and the terminology associated with research activity. It also aims at highlighting the significance of the systematic planning and execution of research activity and preparing students to undertake research. This module will enable students to plan the different stages of research.
